School Improvement: Writing and rshp: Meeting for parents

We held a successful curriculum evening for parents on Tuesday 7th February regarding our approach to teaching writing and the relationships and sexual health resource, rshp.scot

The feedback we received from 42 respondees was as follows:

Writing:

Talk 4 writing looks great! Can imagine the approach is really helpful for those with literacy difficulties and social communication difficulties too due to the structures

The new library behind the stage – SPECTACULAR

Would be good to know what stories they are working on in class so we can discuss it at home

Kids seem engaged in story maps so it seems to be working well

Excellent resource. Great to see the progression in the children's writing

Can the slide pack be sent to us so we can practise at home and ensure we are following the same process? My child needs to improve their writing and needs motivation to read more. This process looks really good, would like to carry that on at home Sounds great! A lot of information – examples really helpful

Great to relate the terms * is using at home with the educational aspect

Very informative. A general outline of maths topics with rough dates would be good to support learning at home Thanks. This was really interesting

Can you email out the slides for the writing improvement session so I can go over this

I have definitely been aware of the children talking about writing this year

Rshp:

We like that we can access the information at home to ensure we are saying the same things

Website look up to date and good to know what the children will be learning, which is very important

Fantastic resource, will be going home and reading more. So helpful

Looks good

Sounds good – wish there was online resources for all subjects for parents

The online system looks great. Updates of where they are on seesaw would help us follow the same topics at the same time. This would be more useful than a letter at the start of the year

Links are better than downloadable documents

Great presentation

I think that having more information about what is being taught throughout the term will be beneficial Great that we can align the same resources. I'm really glad you're proactively addressing the online space. It would be really helpful to know when specific lessons are coming up





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Good that parents have full visibility of what's being taught as kids are too embarrassed to tell parents about it so therefore unknown what kids knew

Full information

I just wanted to send an email to say how impressed I was with last night's talk particularly the information given about the RSHP programme. Your approach to this is spot on, normalising sexual health discussions in an inclusive and age appropriate way. I feel passionate about educating our young people around sexual health and relationships and to raise awareness of sexual exploitation and abuse in order to keep them and those around them safe. I really appreciate Clober Primary holding the same values. Thank you all for all that you do!

We will begin rshp lessons next term. A letter will be sent to all parents with links to the lessons which will be delivered to your child. In addition, teaching staff will post on Seesaw when specific lessons are covered.

School roll for next session

Numbers for P1 entrants are being finalized; it is likely that we will continue with 14 classes next session, two classes per stage. There's lots to organise between now and June and I will keep you informed regarding staffing and class structure when plans are finalised.

Reporting pupil progress

All classes will receive an end of year report, which will detail progress and next steps in literacy, numeracy and health and wellbeing. This will be issued to parents in June.

Parking

We have recently had news that we will be a pilot school for EDC's Traffic-Free Schools pilot project. This is where small sections of road immediately outside the entrance to schools are closed to motor vehicle traffic for a short period of time at the start and end of the school day. The aims of the project are to improve road safety for all children and adults accessing the school, while at the same time, making the areas more attractive for journeys to be made by walking, wheeling and cycling. It is a requirement for the Council's Place, Neighbourhood and Corporate Assets Committee to give approval before the pilot can begin but in advance of this, a council officer met with the senior management team and the chair of the Parent Council this week to discuss the scope for the pilot and how we can feed into the development and delivery of the project.

In the meantime, our Junior JRSOs, Jennifer and Xander, have organised walk and wheel to school week. They have also surveyed the children in school to ask about their road safety and parking concerns and will be sharing this over the next few weeks. The JRSOs also plan to devise a parking charter to ensure everyone understands the need to park safely while we wait for the traffic free schools plan to be implemented. Additional bike and scooter shelters will be installed in the school grounds.

Promoting Positive Behaviour

As part of our school improvement plan, we have revisited our approach to promoting positive behaviour. Consultation with the teaching and support staff, Parent Council and Pupil Council has resulted in the production of our Behaviour Blueprint. I have attached a copy of it to this newsletter. As part of this initiative, we have established Hot Chocolate Wednesday as a reward to those who behave above and beyond. We have also introduced Good News! Postcards home and kindness and respect





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chains in classes. We are really seeing a difference when we are consistent in our behaviour expectations.

They were kept very busy with a range of indoor and outdoor pursuits and in the evenings they enjoyed a murder mystery night, film night, disco and a walk to the ice cream shop in Largs. 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Recognising Pupils' Achievements outwith Clober Primary

We encourage children to tell us about their achievements outwith school however big or small. For this reason we would like your help. If you feel that your child has accomplished something for the first time, improved in something or has achieved an award (yellow belt in Judo, a badge at Scouts /Brownies/Boys Brigade etc) then please let us know by emailing the office. This will then be discussed at assembly, your child will receive a certificate and will be added to our achievements wall and records.

Road Safety

Please refrain from parking on the yellow zigzags outside the school gate and the white markings opposite. This gives our children enough space to be able to look both ways and cross in safety. Although it can be frustrating in the morning when you are in a rush or on wet days, it is important to remember that I ask this to ensure that all our children are safe. This will continue to be enforced and monitored.

Arrival times for school

Children can arrive any time between 9am and 9.10am. Dismissal is at 3.05pm, except P1 who will be matched to their adults at 3pm.

Dates for the Diary

You can find all dates for the diary for session 2020-21 on our website; look under the school Information tab. **Important Reminders**

Nut Free School: Please do not send your child to school with any items containing nuts or nut traces. We have children within the school who have severe allergic reactions which could result in anaphylactic shock.

Medication: Only certain members of staff are allowed to administer medication to pupils. This can only be done after the parent has completed the necessary paperwork. We have strict guidelines which we must follow.

Parking: Please do not park on the pavements, block driveways or double park outside the school. Too often there have been near misses at the school gate. Please think of all children and park away from the school at all times. St Luke's Church car park is a suitable place.

Wet Intervals: Wherever possible, children will be outside at break times. Please ensure they have a named waterproof jacket with them every day – regardless of the forecast as we all know how reliable they can be!

If the weather is terribly wet, we provide your child with activities to do during wet intervals. If you would like to provide your child with a book or small, inexpensive game, that would be great. Please do not send your child in with any valuable items such a PSP or iPods.

Anti Vandalism / Health & Safety: Please report any sightings to the police. As you know we are Newsletter March 2023





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equipped with CCTV cameras and these are very beneficial to us. Such cameras are fully operational both day and night and allow us to identify and report any vandalism.

Head Lice: Please check your child's head on a regular basis and inform the school if you find an infestation.

Physical Education

At the moment, PE must be done outdoors. Please send your child to school dressed for PE. Waterproofs and sensible footwear should be worn. No jewellery is permitted.

All Jewellery MUST be removed during Physical Activities (incl PE): I would ask that you refrain from piercing your child's ears until the beginning of the summer holidays as any size of earring prohibits your child from taking part in physical activities. Policy states that staff cannot remove jewellery.

Mobile phones: EDC policy states that any child requiring a mobile phone in school should hand their phone into the school office each morning and collect it at the end of the day. No smart watches should be worn in school.

Attendance: We monitor attendance every morning and afternoon session. If your child is going to be absent please contact the school office on **0141 955 2232.** Failure to do this puts a series of actions in place which could result in calling the Attendance Officer and Police Scotland. If your child is late please explain that he/she must pass the office to check off their name. The class teacher may have already alerted the office to begin the attendance check procedures and your child coming to the office when late could stop this procedure more quickly.
